2024 HIGHLIGHTS



Program Development

2024 brought about new ways of resourcing UTO congregations based on feedback that we received from our UTO Parish leaders. What we heard was that you wanted seasonal materials printed (or at least enough to get you started) and that shipping costs were a barrier to using materials. These changes immediately created an increase in materials ordered for use in congregations and by families.

In 2024 we added new materials for Christmas, moved our fall resources to October, and began translating our materials into Spanish or adapting them for use in Spanish-language contexts. We also published our 8th edition of our popular book of prayers, updated our website to make it easier to navigate, and launched our podcast: Good News and Gratitude.

Trainings & Support

in 2024 we continued to develop ways to support our leaders better and made the decision to move the majority of our financial resources into creating and providing resources for our leaders.

This year we hosted our annual virtual training day in addition to workshops in the UTO Office during General Convention. We held trainings in English and in Spanish, trainings for people who wanted to support grant applicants in their diocese. UTO Staff also hosted a workshop on grant writing and finding granting sources.

UTO BOARD FINANCES

Income Overview

2024 marks the final year that UTO would receive funding from the General Convention Budget. The UTO Board and Staff made changes in 2024 to prepare for this decrease in funding. We decreased our full time staff from two people to one, but added consultants who are very limited in hours in order to not decrease the services we are able to offer.

UTO is funded through three trust funds: The Memorial Trust (for which we continue to fundraise), The Bell Trust, and 29% of the Wright Trust. These trust funds are instrumental in our ability to provide resources to congregations without cost. UTO is committed to providing formation and stewardship resources rooted in gratitude to anyone who wants to use them, and we are grateful to those who support the Memorial Trust for helping make that happen each year.

Printed Material Costs

Each year, when we are creating new materials, we have to take into consideration the cost of producing items, and that cost just continues to rise. We currently work with a small business in Albuquerque, New Mexico to produce all of our printed materials. This has helped to decrease the price per item of our printed materials simply because they are no longer being shipped, it also means we're being better stewards of the environment. (In the past, our items were printed in New York, shipped to Arizona and then shipped to congregations.) We try to print non-seasonal items in bulk to lower the cost per item and we only print the exact number of seasonal items ordered by the deadline to keep the cost to a minimum.

2024 EXPENSES

In 2023, the UTO Board budget was \$437,115. UTO Spent \$421,505.03 in 2023, returning \$15,609.97 to the General Convention Fund.



Thank Offerings

I appreciate UTO because it is a ministry that inspires dreams on every level and is accessible to everyone. Every single person, no matter their age or wealth, can give.



2024 INGATHERING


Income Overview

Each year, UTO gives away 100% of the funds we collect to support innovative mission and ministry. The total amount of funds that UTO can award comes from a variety of sources. The chart to the right shows you where the funds come from. (Use the QR code below to see a full accounting of the ingathering since 2000.)



2024 Total Ingathering: \$1,079,748.37

This year the total Ingathering increased 7% over last year! 2024 also represents the first year since the pandemic that the Board has not taken direct action to try and increase the Ingathering, either through adding additional funds from the principal of the Ingathering Trust Fund or through fundraising efforts like the challenge grant for the Church in Jerusalem. We are hopeful that this means the decline in giving that many non-profits experienced during the pandemic has come to an end. With that said, the Board is watching the 2025 Ingathering carefully as we know that giving to national non-profits is projected to decline in 2025 due to economic issues in the United States. With your help, we will continue to do all that we can to raise funds to continue to support innovative mission and ministry projects around the globe.

SPOTLIGHT ON:

Granting

Many times, the smallest grant applications are the ones that have the biggest impact on your community. Last year, UTO awarded a grant to the Diocese of Cuba (\$19,660) to buy "tricycles" with a project called: "Shortening

Distances, Mitigating Gaps: Missionary Work Without Barriers." This grant purchased three tricycles (see images below) to help transport people living in rural areas to the city, take them to appointments, facilitate their access to clean water and healthy food, offer basic services to vulnerable and forgotten people living in distant, and gives them both community and pastoral services that the congregation offers.

As you can imagine, simply applying for a grant online was challenging for the Diocese of Cuba, so UTO Board Member (and now our Advisor for Spanish Language Outreach and Support), Lorraine Candelario Moctezuma (Puerto Rico), jumped into action to help them. Sometimes, things get lost in translations, so having Lorraine (pictured above on the left with Ms. Adua García, president of the ECW, Diocese of Cuba) support our Spanish language dioceses is invaluable. This project was completed quickly, but the impact on the community is ongoing and transformative.

With a heart full of gratitude, we believe that this generous grant that the UTO has awarded us will make a difference in the missionary work of our church. Your support is a light of hope in the current Cuban context, where socioeconomic and geographic gaps have left many isolated and in the shadow of inequality. Your help comes at a crucial time, allowing us to strengthen our impact beyond the walls of the church and revitalize the catechetical, recreational and service programs that are vital to our people. With these new means of transportation, we will be able to bring together people of African descent, the elderly, the disabled, and migrants from the east of the country, who have been disproportionately affected by poverty and isolation. This project will not only improve mobility and access to basic services, but will also raise the self-esteem, mental health and resilience of our brothers and sisters in Christ. The economic and social situation of the most vulnerable groups will go from being an obstacle, an isolator, a barrier, to now become new opportunities, better services, fair and equitable treatment, and all this is thanks to the UTO grant and to the work and availability of a team of volunteers who will have new resources to implement concrete actions.

2024 GRANT AWARDS







\$1,003,283.78

was awarded for projects addressing the focus of "the stranger" Jesus mentions in Matthew 25, offering welcome and inclusivity. Specifically, projects that welcome people with differences that cause isolation (culture, life experience, disability, mental health, etcetera) in new ways that are meaningful and deemed necessary by that community or projects that encourage truth telling, acknowledging historic trauma, and establishing a pathway towards healing.

PRESERVING OUR HISTORY: THE EMERY TRUST





The Emery Trust fund was established in 1923 in honor of Julia Chester Emery and her dedication to women who served as missionaries through the United Thank Offering. The fund was established to do two things: provide funding for missionaries to return home to see their families, rest, and fundraise, or for missionaries who needed funding for continuing education. (Many of the UTO Missionaries were teachers and nurses.) In addition to directly supporting missionaries, the fund was to provide for the care and upkeep of the "UTO Rest Rooms" at the Church Center and all of the artifacts contained within them. As you may know, UTO was established to fund mission and ministry not provided for through the church budget, so when women became eligible to be Episcopal Church missionaries, the need for this fund needed to adapt and change as well. For a time, the fund was used as a way to send Christmas gifts to all Episcopal Church missionaries, and the artifacts in the "UTO Rest Rooms" were lovingly packed up and transported to the Archives of The Episcopal Church in Austin, Texas. Then for many years, the interest from this fund simply contributed to building up the principal of the trust. In 2018, the UTO Board worked with Executive Council to update the trust language to reflect the changing missionary landscape of The Episcopal Church while also keeping the original language of the trust active. Since 2018, the interest from the trust has support missionaries sent via Global Partners, Episcopal Service Corps Volunteers, and the preservation of the artifact of the United Thank Offering and the Women's Auxiliary through the Archives of The Episcopal Church.

The Finance and Archives Committee of the UTO Board traveled to Austin to visit the Archives and learn more about their work in January 2025 (this was delayed from the fall of 2024 but mostly funded out of the 2024 budget). Above you'll find a photo of the committee meeting with staff in addition to a picture of Julia Chester Emery's travel documents from 1908. The Emery Trust is an important connection to the roots of our ministry, and we are grateful for the gift of our predecessors in the creation of this trust to continue to support the important work of missionaries and the archives.



It was wonderful to be gathered together with others in Kentucky for General Convention during the summer of 2024. For UTO, it was a chance to share the resources we have for congregations and individuals with a wider audience in addition to connecting with lifelong members of UTO. It was wonderful to give thanks in person with so many of you who weathered so many storms through the pandemic. I was also aware of those no longer able to be with us or who have died since we were together in Texas. Mostly, I ended each day very tired and very grateful.


As many of you know, I had surgery just a few weeks prior to convention starting, and while I was cleared to attend, I was not allowed to lift anything more than ten pounds and I was supposed to not "overdo it". The first meant that I had to depend on everyone else a lot more than I usually do during Convention. Thankfully, my husband, kids, Katelyn Kenney, and the UTO Board all stepped up to carry materials back and forth, set up booths in two different hotels, and admonish me anytime I came near anything heavy. On our way back to New Mexico, I spent a great deal of time thinking about how grateful I was to everyone who helped me, especially those that know I'm not great at asking for help for things like carrying boxes.

I also spent sometime reflecting on was a question I got asked by one of the kids at the Children's Program. One day when I was talking about gratitude, they very sincerely looked at me and asked, "but do you really think gratitude makes a difference" to which I said, "I do". Now I wish I could have had time to say something different. I wish I would have thanked that kiddo for the incredible person they are, and for the cool things I watched them do over the span of Convention, because what I'm coming to see is that we start to understand that gratitude makes a difference when we experience it ourselves. It is a truly remarkable thing to be sincerely thanked, and to sincerely thank someone. Through these actions we are acknowledging our love and connection to the other person. At the end of Convention I was struck by the joy that gratitude brings, the connection it creates in an increasingly isolated world, and the need to keep inviting others to join us in this very important work.

Thank you to everyone I got to meet or reconnect with in Kentucky, please know that I am incredibly grateful for you and your work with UTO. Together we are changing the world one "thank you" at a time.

GRATITUDE RESOURCES

Good News and Gratitude

In 2024 UTO launched our first ever podcast! The first season (Fall 2024-Spring 2025) is hosted by the Rev. Our podcast is produced by Asma Lee and already has a strong following of over 1,700 listeners (which we're told is great for a first season)! We're so grateful for Erin and Asma for making this podcast for us, and for all of you who have shared your love of the pod with us on social media.

Material Shipment Changes

For years, UTO has created seasonal formation for congregations to use on our website. As we began to reimagine how we send out materials, we asked for feedback from our UTO leaders and found that if we printed the seasonal materials they would get used more by parishes. Hearing this feedback, beginning with the Spring/Summer mailing, we included a gratitude practice for congregations and it was a big hit! While we're planning to refine our ordering system in 2025 after a second round of feedback, we're thrilled with the increase in orders we've seen since we've moved to kits and free shipping. 
Other Materials

In addition to our podcast and shipment of materials we also created:

- · New Christmas materials for families.
- **Spanish translations** of all UTO materials that are shipped.
- Kits for Diocesan Conventions including giveaways and QR codes to help parishes sign up or order materials.
- Updated evergreen materials we created new materials (brochures) that mirror the information on our website to help people navigate resources.
- Updated UTO website we've streamlined information based on feedback from members.
- Seasonal Text Messages for those that want to use our resources from their phone, we upgraded our text message program in 2024 to include our fall gratitude calendar.
- Updated Grant Brochure that can fold out to be a poster and can be printed locally.

One of our goals in 2024 was to try out new methods of shipping materials and the kinds of materials we create, print and include. We have embraced new forms of technology to share our message of gratitude and make it more accessible for parishes and individuals.









2025 GOALS

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

In 2025, the Executive Committee of the UTO Board will continue to seek out new partners and opportunities to share the Spiritual Discipline of Gratitude.

Parishes: We'll continue to build our database of UTO parishes and ensure timely and effective communication.

FINANCE & ARCHIVES

In 2025, The Finance and Archives Committee will continue to work on supporting the UTO Board and Staff in utilizing our funding to support growing grateful hearts. We will also continue to work with The Archives to preserve UTO artifacts and ensure the UTO story continues to be told.

Provinces: We'll continue to ensure resources are available to our Province Representatives to travel to province-wide events to promote UTO.

Dioceses: We'll continue to find ways to support the needs of our diocesan leaders through resources and best financial practice trainings.

Parishes: We're working to develop a new seasonal stewardship program for parishes that is rooted in gratitude and has materials for all ages.

In 2025, the Grants Committee is excited to introduce an innovative focus for the 2026 grant cycle and to continue to work to make our granting process easier and clearer for our applicants.

Provinces: We began accepting provincial grants again for the 2025 grant cycle so we hope you will help your dioceses work together on ideas and applications!

Dioceses: The Grants Committee is committed to helping dioceses in their own internal grant selection process if desired--just ask!

Parishes: We thank the many parishes who apply for grants and submit amazing grant updates, pictures, stories, and even songs!

FORMATION & DEVELOPMENT

In 2025, the Formation & Development Committee of the UTO Board will continue to create and distribute accessible and engaging materials and programs for all ages, with the primary goal of inviting others to the Spiritual Discipline of Gratitude.
